



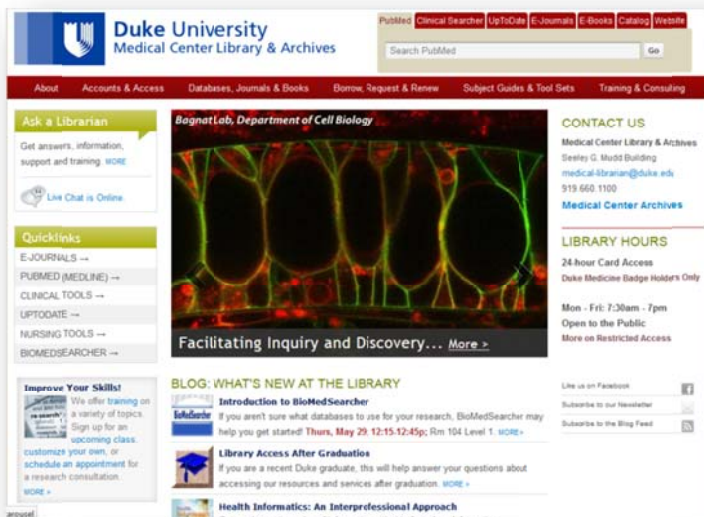
## Global Health Services



### Access to Library Resources

Our web site is freely accessible on the internet, but most of our e-journals, databases and e-books are only accessible on the Duke network or via **EZProxy** or the **Virtual Private Network (VPN)**.

- **EZProxy** requires no special software; you can visit the Library's web site and resources as if you are on campus and you will simply be asked to log in to some resources using your NetID and password. **You must connect from the Library's web page – [mclibrary.duke.edu](http://mclibrary.duke.edu) – in order to activate the EZProxy.**
- **VPN** is available for additional resources not accessible via EZProxy, but it is very slow in low bandwidth locations. Resources accessible through VPN and not EZProxy are LexiComp, Micromedex, ExitCare Patient Education, Pivot, and StatRef. The VPN requires signing in via a web-based VPN before visiting these resources. ## Searching

**Accessing articles:** Use Duke PubMed ([www.mclibrary.duke.edu/pubmed](http://www.mclibrary.duke.edu/pubmed)), then click on single citation matcher, then the Get it at Duke button to connect with EZProxy



### Searching for articles on a topic:

1. Focus question by identifying the main concepts in your topic
2. Show me the details!
  - Check search details box on results page to see if you were mapped to a relevant MeSH term
3. Remember the MeSH!
  - If you weren't mapped to a good MeSH term, look up a better one in the MeSH database
4. Use Advanced Search to combine sets with ANDs and ORs
5. Apply limits / Clinical Queries at the end

### Other Tips:

- Create a MyNCBI account to save your search, get email updates, and create collections of favorite articles.
- Consider creating an EndNote library of relevant articles before heading out into the field. That way you are downloading where internet is free and bandwidth is strong.
- If you aren't finding what you think should be out there, just contact Megan for help.



## A Word About HINARI

HINARI is a free digital library accessible to individuals at registered institutions in eligible developing countries. This is a great resource to point international colleagues to in clinical, research and academic settings. You will also have access to HINARI if the institution you are visiting is eligible and registered.

- <http://extranet.who.int/hinari/en/journals.php>: HINARI URL. If your institution is eligible, you can use HINARI while there. But, there are strong restrictions: you cannot use HINARI at an internet café, cannot post the password online, or use a HINARI account from outside the country of the institution. Generally, you can get the password from the institution's librarian.
